SITUATION REPORT

August 22, 2007 14:00 hours

(New information in italics)

On the morning of August 20, 2007; Laclede County received a large amount of rainfall resulting in massive flooding and damage throughout the county. The National Weather Service confirmed Tuesday that an EF-0 tornado formed over southeastern Laclede County and touched down in western Texas County.

FATALITIES – 1

A 51 year old man died while driving his vehicle in the 27000 block of Sassafras Drive at approximately 1700 hours. The victim was a mail carrier delivering mail when his vehicle was witnessed being washed off the roadway due to flooding and compromised roadway. After a search of the area, his vehicle was located approximately 1/8 mile downstream, and his body was located approximately 2 miles downstream. (County Commission and EOC Staff)

INJURIES – 0

PUBLIC SAFETY

Numerous water rescues have taken place today and have been reported by public safety agencies to the EOC. At this time, no other details are available. (EOC Staff)

INFRASTRUCTURE

Joel E. Barber School reported flooding / water in the building at approximately 1700 hours, forcing them to cancel events scheduled for this evening. (County Commission)

Joel E. Barber School reported minor damage in the school due to flooding. (EOC Staff)

Gasconade School reported minor damage in the school due to flooding. (EOC Staff)

The Laclede County Emergency Operations Center has sustained minor damage due to water seeping into the EOC. (EOC Staff)

A private dam has failed near the intersection of Delta & United in Southeast Laclede County. The dam failure has caused the intersection of Delta & United Roads to wash out and become impassible. Flooding to a barn in the area was also reported. (Nebo Falcon Fire)

ROADS & BRIDGES

Numerous bridges and culvert systems have failed. Those known roadways that have been compromised and closed are due to system failure, roadway washout, debris, and continued flooding are:

The Laclede County Road and Bridge Department reports that virtually every county road has suffered some damage, some in multiple locations, due to flooding, roadway washout / compromise, culvert washout / compromise, and/or debris.

The Laclede County Road and Bridge Department and Laclede County Commission are still in the process of assessing roadways for damage and

performing emergency repairs. The Laclede County Commission has requested assistance from MODOT to inspect bridges that may have been compromised.

MODOT Engineers have assessed some bridges in question in conjunction with the Laclede County Road and Bridge Department and the Laclede County Commission. Bridges that were in question have been deemed safe, but in need of repair by MODOT Engineers.

The Laclede County Commission and Laclede County Road and Bridge Department advise that they are still finding slabs and roads damaged, and have yet to be able to survey all roads, due to accessibility. Current damage estimates for Laclede County are \$5.5 million.

The City of Lebanon reports one road still closed, South Tower Road, due to water over the roadway. The City of Lebanon estimates that the road will remain closed for approximately 1 week. It is currently unknown if the roadway has sustained any damage.

OUTLOOK

The National Weather Service reports high heat indices today and tonight. Thunderstorms will be possible from late Thursday night through Saturday as a cold front moves across the Ozarks. The best chance for thunderstorms will be Friday Night and Saturday. A few storms may approach severe intensities. The main hazard with the storms will be the potential for additional heavy rain.

LOCAL ACTIONS

The Laclede County Office of Emergency Management has activated the Emergency Operations Center, and is currently coordinating agencies and resources as needed. The Office of Emergency Management will perform limited damage assessment during the overnight hours. The Laclede County Road and Bridge Department will continue their assessments on Tuesday Morning. The next EOC Agency Briefing will be held on Tuesday, August 21st at 1400 hours at the Emergency Operations Center.

The Laclede County Office of Emergency Management is still tabulating damage reports and conducting damage surveys. The Office of Emergency Management has been in contact with the State Emergency Management Agency regarding a Public Assistance Declaration. The Laclede County Road and Bridge Department and Laclede County Commission are continuing to assess damage to roads and bridges in Laclede County. The County Commission hopes to have a total damage estimate available by the Wednesday EOC Briefing.

The Laclede County Office of Emergency Management is still tabulating damage reports and conducting damage surveys. State Emergency Management Agency regarding a Public Assistance Declaration The Laclede County Road and Bridge Department and Laclede County Commission are continuing to assess damage to roads and bridges in Laclede County. The Laclede County Commission plans to have a complete list of roadway damages assembled by Tuesday, August 28th. Laclede County is seeking a Public Assistance Declaration. There is not a scheduled EOC Briefing, however one will be held as needed, and updates provided.
